CRAWFORD COUNTY FAIR RULES AND REGULATIONS

HOW TO ENTER Visit www.crawfordcountywisconsinfair.com/exhibitors

Read all rules, regulations, department descriptions and items carefully, even if you are a returning exhibitor.

Read the Code of Conduct found on page 4 of the premium book. When you submit your online entry, you acknowledge you have read and understand the Liability Agreement, Code of Conduct, Rules, and Regulations and agree to abide by all items contained within the agreements.

Each exhibitor will receive a complementary Season Pass for entrance onto the fairgrounds and all grandstand events.

Entries will be accepted online only. Online entry will open on June 1st and will close at 9:00 PM, June 30th at www.crawfordcountywisconsinfair.com/exhibitors; no entries will be accepted after the deadline. If you have any problems with registration or picking up tags within the designated timeframes, you must contact the Fair Coordinator prior to the deadline. If you do not have computer access, please contact the Fair Office to arrange the use of a computer or visit your local library.

- 1. The Junior division competition is open to all members in good standing with a supervised youth group. Youth in grades K-2 may enter only Department 17J. All other Junior Division youth must be in grade 3 or up, and less than 20 years of age. **Ages and grades are as of January 1 of the current year.**
- 2. No exhibitor may enter in both the Junior and Open Division in the same department.
- 3. All exhibitors who plan to stay overnight at the Crawford County fairgrounds must complete an Overnight Registration Form. All exhibitors, siblings and parents must have an admission wristband. See Overnight Form.
- 4. Campers are encouraged to utilize the Stump Dodger Campground adjacent to the fairgrounds. Camping at the fairgrounds is allowed for exhibitors and superintendents. No camper may arrive prior to the Wednesday of the fair and must be removed on the last day of the fair. All campers/tents must be registered with the Fair Office and fees paid before placing your camper/tent and camping will only be allowed in approved areas. Campers may be pre-registered at time of tag pick-up and will be provided with a registration number, those without numbers displayed will be fined \$20 per night. Please be courteous to neighbors when using generators or other equipment while camping.
- 5. Premiums paid will be determined by the maximum placing's by state aid and as determined by the judges. No entry can be entered twice into the fair in any category in any department. If entered multiple times both items will be disqualified.
- 6. Only one entry may be exhibited under each item number and must be prepared since the prior fair.
- 7. The premiums awarded by the Fair will be indicated as follows:

 1st Premium Blue Ribbon, 2nd Premium Red Ribbon, 3rd Premium White Ribbon, 4th Ribbon Pink Ribbon, Grand Champion- Royal Purple Ribbon, Reserve Grand Champion Royal Pink Ribbon, Best in Class Red & Black Rosette, Merit Orange Ribbon. Trophy Award to Grand Champion and Plaque Award to Reserve Champion/Best in Department/Showmanship Classes.
- 8. Exhibitors receiving sticker ribbons may come to the fair office on Sunday from 3:00 5:00 PM to receive a ribbon for their sticker ribbon.
- 9. If there is one entry in a class, the premium awarded shall be determined by the judge.
- 10. No individual exhibit may be entered in more than one class or awarded more than one premium.

- 11. The Fair Board will take precautions for the safekeeping of all exhibits after arrival but will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur. Exhibitors shall give personal attention to their exhibits and attend their removal when released.
- 12. Animals two months or younger will be prohibited from being given away or sold at the fair.
- 13. Animals sold at the Meat Animal Auction will be released at 2:30 PM on Sunday for shipping to the locker plants.
- 14. ALL OTHER EXHIBITS WILL BE RELEASED at 4:00 PM, THE LAST DAY OF THE FAIR. Exhibitors who remove any exhibits prior to 4:00 PM on Sunday will forfeit all premiums. See ATCP Chapter 160.03, article 4.
- 15. Exhibits must be picked up by 5:00 PM on the last day of the fair. Items left at the fairgrounds will be left on the Cabin porch for 1 week, all items will be disposed of after that.
- 16. No soliciting at the Crawford County Fair without Fair Board permission. This includes flyers posted or distributed at the fairgrounds.
- 17. Entry fees are to be paid when exhibitor packet is picked up and are due prior to showing/exhibiting.
- 18. All corrections for entry errors need to be submitted by the Friday prior to fair. Correction forms are available on the fair website.
- 19. New animal exhibitors must attend Consumer Protection Training to exhibit at the Crawford County Fair.
- 20. Award recipients will be listed in local newspapers and on the Fair website prior to October 1.
- 21. Premium checks will be available for pick-up beginning the 2nd Thursday in October at the UW-Extension Office. If you would like your premium check(s) mailed you must provide a postage paid, self-addressed envelope and a list of individuals whose checks need to be included. Premium checks are void after 90 days.
- 22. A Premium Summary may be obtained with a fee of \$10.00 per exhibitor.

CODE OF CONDUCT

By submitting an online entry form, exhibitors acknowledge that they have read and understood the Code of Conduct and the Liability Agreement as stated.

- 1. Participation in the Crawford County Fair is open to everyone.
- 2. Open exhibitors, along with Junior Division exhibitors and their parents, agree to abide by the rules and regulations governing entries, exhibits, judging, payment of premiums and general rules of the Crawford County Fair.
- 4. All exhibitors and attendees will be expected to:
 - A. Show respect for the rights of others and be courteous at all times.
 - B. Respect the property of others.
 - C. Demonstrate sportsmanship in the show ring, contests, and meetings.
 - D. Be honest and not take unfair advantage of others.
 - E. With respect to the designated consumption areas, no consumption of food or beverages are allowed within the animal exhibit areas.
 - F. Adhere to all applicable laws and ordinances.

Any visitor violating the above rules (as determined by Fair Superintendents, Fair Board members, Judges, or law enforcement officials), shall be reported to the Fair Board; and will be subject to any one or all the following consequences:

- 1. Notification of parents or guardians (if individual is a minor).
- 2. Removal of individual and any or all his/her exhibits from the present year's Fair.
- 3. The individual may be required to appear before the Fair Board to explain his or her actions.
- 4. The privilege to enter exhibit in future Crawford County Fairs may be revoked.
- 5. Premiums may be withheld.

CRAWFORD COUNTY FAIR LIABILITY

Crawford County Fair is not liable for injuries sustained by an exhibitor.

The Crawford County Fair will take reasonable precautions to protect the safety of the exhibits present at the Fair, but owners themselves take the risk of exhibiting them and should any exhibitor/exhibit or portion thereof be injured, damaged, lost or stolen, Crawford County personnel will give assistance toward recovery of the same, but will not be liable or make any payment for the value thereof.

Neither the county of Crawford, Crawford County Fair, or its employees or agents shall be liable for any loss to an exhibitor occasioned by fire, accident, condition of structure, or damage caused by weather to any exhibit, article, equipment, or commercial exhibit left in the building or on the grounds after the close of the Fair.

Exhibitors or owners of animals and/or machinery, stationery or in motion, and any other exhibits need to be properly handled to protect the public from coming in contact with at all times while on the fairgrounds. And every such exhibitor or owner shall indemnify the County of Crawford, Crawford County Fair Board, and its agents and employees from and against claims and demands, costs, charges, and expenses which it or they might incur, suffer, or be put to by reason of failure to take the precaution above referred to or failure to comply with Crawford County Fair rules, policies, or directives. Liability insurance to comply with indemnity provisions is required. Presentation of an entry form shall be deemed acceptance of this provision.

CRAWFORD COUNTY FAIR LIVESTOCK RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. In livestock classes, Junior exhibitors MUST show their own entries unless there is a family or medical emergency. In that case, the superintendent must be notified, and another Junior exhibitor may show those entries.
- 2. Animals must be fed and watered, and their pens/stalls cleaned by 10:00 AM daily. If the animal is taken home early without consent from the Fair Board, the exhibitor will be notified by superintendents and will not be eligible to sell in the Meat Animal Auction the following year.
- 3. Clipping and grooming of the exhibits while on the Fairgrounds is to be done ONLY by the exhibitor, his/her immediate family (mother, father, stepparent, siblings, stepsiblings, or legal guardian) and/or other participating Crawford County Fair junior exhibitors. Exceptions may be considered but must be submitted in writing to the Fair Committee prior to July 1st of the exhibit year.
- 4. To exhibit animals at the Crawford County Fair, youth must have been in at least 3rd grade during the school year just completed. This policy, adopted on March 10, 2004, applies to the Crawford County Fair's Junior Division and Open Division.
- 5. Exhibitors entering registered livestock will be required to furnish a certificate of registration.
- 6. The Crawford County Fair Board prohibits any animals, two months or younger, be given away or sold at the fair.
- 7. Livestock (dairy, beef, sheep, and swine) exhibitors will not receive entry tags. Verify your entries prior to the show.
- 8. Animals turned away at the gate by the vet will be marked with a paint stick, so the superintendents know not to admit the animal.
- 9. No Open Division animal may be entered in the name of any person other than the owner or owners, and should any prove to be otherwise entered, premiums awarded will be forfeited. There are no ownership requirements for Junior Divisions.
- 10. Open Division exhibitors will be allowed two entries under each item of individual animal. Only two animals may be entered and placed in the show ring. Junior Division exhibitors will be allowed two entries under each item of individual animal. Only one animal may be entered and placed in the show ring.
- 11. An animal exhibited in the Open division cannot be shown in Junior Division by another exhibitor.
- 12. All animal exhibitors are required to complete the CONSUMER PROTECTION TRAINING one time.
- 13. Refer to Wisconsin County, District & State Fairs Animal Health Rules and Regulations located online.
- 14. The Animal Identification Form must be completed for all animals (beef, sheep, goats, horses, poultry, rabbits/cavies, domesticated exotic animals, and swine) brought to the Crawford County Fair and all animals must have the appropriate identification for the species. All Market animals must have the appropriate fair issued tag (goats and sheep must have the scrapie tag). The form may be obtained online or at exhibitor tag pick-up. The form must be filled out accurately and must accompany the appropriate animal upon entry into the Crawford County Fairgrounds. Exhibitor numbers will not be issued until these forms are turned in!
- 15. All animals must be checked during VET CHECK TIMES and have the correct paperwork completed at check-in. Any animals not properly identified or without the proper records will be turned away.

DATCP RULES FOR STATE AID

Subchapter I — General Requirements and Definitions

ATCP 160.01 Definitions. As used in this chapter:

- (1) "Breed class" and "breeding class" mean a specific breed within a class such as Holstein in the dairy class.
- **(2)** "Class" means a grouping in which exhibits may be entered, including an animal breed or age group for animal exhibits; a type of produce, crop, or food; or a specific age, age group or educational grade level of exhibitor.
- **(2m)** "Conference judging" means a judging system using a discussion about each exhibit with the entire group.
- (3) "Danish judging system" means a judging system that allows for multiple first, second, third and fourth class selections as provided in s. ATCP 160.91 (4) (b).
- (4) "Department" as it relates to the organizational structure of a fair, means an animal species, production group, or other principal classification of exhibits. As used in any other context, "department" means the state of Wisconsin department of agriculture, trade and consumer protection.
- **(5)** "Division" means one of 3 exhibitor group classifications for a fair and is limited to junior division, open division and senior citizens division.
- **(6)** "Entry class" means a class in which the fair allows exhibitors to submit entries.
- (7) "Exotic domestic animal" means an animal that is not a common farm animal.
- **(7e)** "Face-to-face judging" means a judging system using a semiprivate discussion between the judge and the exhibitor with the following phases:
- (a) Get acquainted.
- **(b)** Learn the background of the exhibit.
- (c) Self-evaluation.
- (d) Evaluator comment.
- (e) Parting.
- (7m) "Fair" means a county or district fair eligible to receive state aid under s. 93.23 (1) (b) or (c), Stats.
- (7s) "Fair board" means the governing entity of a fair.
- **(8)** "Lot" or "lot number" means the numerical designation assigned by a fair for a specific category of exhibits within a class.
- **(9)** "Market class" means a class that includes animals of a certain weight for the species that can be sold for slaughter.
- (10) "Premium" means a monetary prize that a fair awards to an exhibitor after judging all competing exhibits in the class to which the premium pertains.
- (11) "Regular judging system" means a judging system that allows for one first, second, third and fourth class selection as provided in s. <u>ATCP 160.91 (4) (c)</u>.
- (12) "Self determined project" means a project that meets all of the following criteria:
- (a) It is approved by the fair board.
- **(b)** Its subject matter is related to any of the junior fair departments 9, 10, 13 to 16, 18, or 20 to 29.

- (c) It does not fall into a defined entry class within any department.
- (d) It is carried out by a member of a youth organization.
- (13) "Youth organization" means an organization under adult leadership that has educational programing.

ATCP 160.02 Premium requirements.

- (1) GENERAL.
- (a) The state aid authorized by s. 93.23 (1), Stats., may be paid on net premiums paid by a fair. The department may withhold state premium aid from any fair that does not enforce animal health provisions under ch. ATCP 10 that are applicable to animals exhibited at the fair. State aid will be paid only on premiums actually paid by bank check or draft.
- **(b)** No deductions may be made from premium money won by an exhibitor. Premiums may, however, be withheld where exhibition rules established by the fair association are violated. A written statement of violation shall be submitted to the department to justify actions taken by a fair
- **(c)** Premiums offered shall be definite in amount. No decrease or increase in published premiums may be made because of the financial condition or the organization or for any other reason.
- (e) No fair may receive state aid for a premium awarded to any exhibitor in the open division if that exhibitor entered the same exhibit in the junior division at the same fair. This paragraph does not apply if the exhibit was entered in the junior division only as part of a herd group, carcass class or performance class.
- (f) No state aid will be paid on the cost of ribbons, cups, trophy prizes or entertainment contests.
- **(2)** Premium lists.
- (a) Premiums for which state aid is requested by county and district fairs shall conform with the uniform premium list and other requirements set forth in these rules. Fairs requesting state aid for net premiums shall submit to the department a printed copy of the premium list used at the fair, as required under s. ATCP 160.92 (3) (c).
- **(b)** The officers of each fair shall mail a copy of the premium list to other associations, societies, or boards conducting a fair in Wisconsin upon request.
- (c) Sections ATCP
- $\underline{160.01}$ through $\underline{160.07}$ and $\underline{160.91}$ shall be published in premium books used by a fair for which state aid is requested.
- (3) Entry fees.
- (a) A fair may charge an exhibitor an entry fee or charge stall rents for animals, or both.
- **(b)** Exhibitors in department 35 shall not be required to purchase an exhibitor's ticket. Any other exhibitor may be required, if no entry fee is charged, to purchase an

exhibitor's season ticket at a price not to exceed that charged for a non-exhibitor's season ticket.

- (4) SPLIT FAIR DATES.
- (a) For purposes of this subsection, "split fair dates" occur when a fair organization judges exhibits or contests and pays premiums at more than one time or at more than one location during the calendar year.
- (b) Except as provided under par. (c), the department may not pay state aid for a fair having split dates unless the department gives advance written approval for a split fair. The department may approve split dates based on hardship.
- **(c)** The department may pay state aid for the following exhibits or contests in a fair having split dates with advance notification to the department:
- 1. Clothing revue.
- 2. Demonstrations.
- **3.** Favorite foods revue.
- 4. Dogs.
- 4m. Cats.
- **5.** Small animals.
- **6.** Rocketry.
- **7.** Shooting sports.
- 7m. Mechanical projects.
- **8.** Other exhibits and contests that are similar to those identified in subds. 1. to 7.
- (d) If there are split dates under par. (b) or (c), all blue ribbon winners shall repeat their demonstrations or exhibits at the regular fair dates unless the department grants a hardship exemption. An exhibitor may use audiovisual media, still photography or an educational display to repeat a demonstration or exhibit.

ATCP 160.03 Exhibition requirements. A fair shall meet all of the exhibition requirements of this section to be eligible for state premium aid.

- (1) No fair society or other organization sponsoring a fair may require an exhibitor to become a member of the organization in order to enter an exhibit at the fair, nor may the sponsoring organization make any deduction from an exhibitor's premium as a donation to the fair society, or require an exhibitor in any other way to make a donation to the society.
- **(2)** State aid may not be approved for out-of-state exhibits or for separate classes of local and non-local exhibitors. Aid may not be approved for payment of premiums to an exhibitor having an out-of-state address but claiming Wisconsin residency unless the fair secretary provides the

- department with an affidavit that the exhibitor's residence is geographically located within the state.
- (3) State aid may be paid only on articles or animals actually on display in an exhibit building or actually shown in the show ring on regular fair dates unless approval for split fair dates is obtained under s. <u>ATCP 160.02 (4)</u>. State aid may not be paid on Dairy Herd Improvement Association records, transportation aid, production contests or other special educational exhibits unless prior approval is obtained under s. <u>ATCP 160.49 (7)</u>.
- (4) State aid may not be paid on exhibits removed from the fairgrounds before 4 p.m. on the last day of the fair, or such other later time as may be specified by the fair, without prior approval of the department. Authority for earlier removal may be granted by the department in case of meat animal sales or other special classes, if requested before the beginning of the fair. In other hardship cases, approval may be granted by the fair. Exhibits in dog obedience and small animal pet classes may be judged during the regular fair but are not required to remain present during the entire fair. The fair may prescribe the length of time junior fair exhibitors of horses shall keep their animal on the ground.

ATCP 160.05 Open division; general requirements.

- (1) The total maximum premiums set forth for all places in any open division livestock class, excluding poultry and rabbits, may be divided into multiple premiums for a greater number of places, but the maximum premium offered for any additional place shall not be higher than the maximum for the last place in the class.
- **(2)** All animals in any open division class shall be owned by the exhibitor, except as provided in s. <u>ATCP 160.09</u>.
- **(3)** State aid may be paid on no more than 2 premiums awarded an exhibitor under one premium or lot number in open division individual livestock classes, except poultry and rabbits, and no more than one premium in all other classes, including poultry and rabbits.
- **(4)** State aid may not be used to award a premium to an exhibitor who exhibits an item or animal that has been exhibited in open class division previously in a state aid funded fair in that calendar year and resulted in a premium being awarded for that item or animal.
- **(5)** The fair board may establish specific classes by professional and amateur level groupings within classes for open class departments 14 to 28.

ATCP 160.07 Classes; general requirements.

(1) Classes may be combined if the number of entries in several single classes is insufficient. If any classes are

combined, state aid shall be limited to the maximum total premiums listed for a single class of animals, items or articles in that department.

(2)

- (a) Except as provided under par. (b), no fair may receive state aid for premiums awarded for sexually intact male dairy cattle, beef cattle, sheep, goats, swine or horses unless those animals are registered. Registered status shall be documented by a certificate of registry from the appropriate breed association or society, or by a copy of the application for registration.
- (b) Paragraph (a) does not apply to dairy cattle exhibited at a fair if a national breed association certifies that those dairy cattle are recorded in that breed association's qualified herd book which records the genealogy of that breed
- **(3)** Any animal entered as part of a group class may also be exhibited in a class for individual animals.
- **(4)** Boars may not be entered as an exhibit in the swine department unless their tusks have been removed.
- **(5)** The age of an animal, for purposes of determining its entry class under this chapter, shall be determined as of the opening day of the fair.

Subchapter V — Judging and Accounting ATCP 160.91 Judging regulations.

(1) Judging shall be done at fairs by individuals who are registered with the department. In no case shall any person who is an officer or director of a fair be eligible to judge exhibits at such fair; nor shall any person interested directly or indirectly in exhibits shown in any department of a fair be eligible to judge articles or animals in that department.

(1m)

(a) An individual shall register by submitting to the department an application. The department shall register all individuals who qualify to be judges, including having the knowledge, training, or experience in the specific classes to be judged and adhering to ethical judging practices. The registration is valid for five years.

- **(b)** An individual submitting an application after July 1 may not judge for the current fair year.
- (c) A fair representative may request the department waive par. (b) in cases of unanticipated emergency situations.
- (2) Each judge at a fair shall be provided with a copy of the fair's premium book or list of entry classes at least 7 days prior to the opening date of the fair.
- **(3)** No animal or article, irrespective of the number of entries in the class in which it is entered, shall be awarded a higher rating than its merit would entitle it to in comparison to the standard of perfection in the class.

(4)

- (a) Danish system judging may be used in the junior fair division. State aid may not be paid on premiums awarded under the Danish system in any other division.
- **(b)** When classes in the junior fair division are judged according to the Danish system, 4 group placings shall be awarded in any class. When there are less than 8 exhibitors in the class, there shall not be more than 2 in the first group, not more than 4 in the first 2 groups and not more than 6 in the first 3 groups. If there are 8 or more entries in the class, there shall not be more than 25% in the first group, not more than 50% in the first 2 groups, and not more than 75% in the first 3 groups.
- **(c)** The number of awards in the last group placing may be increased to the extent necessary to give awards to all exhibitors.
- (4g) When classes in the junior fair division are judged using the conference judging system, the judge shall use sub. (4) (b) and (c) to award placements in a class.
- **(5)** If any class of exhibits at a fair is judged according to the regular system, the judges for that class may give only one first-place, one second-place, one third-place and one fourth-place award in that class.

Official entries must include the name and birthdates of animals entered. Changes may be made at the Fair for a \$5.00 per change fee, no additions will be allowed. Example: If a Registered Holstein Spring Calf named CCFair Atwood Mary is entered, CCFair Jasper Susan may be substituted at the Fair, but CCFair Jasper Susan may not be added to the Official Form at the Fair. Exhibitors will need to sign that the Official Entry Form is correct at the Fair to receive their back tag. The Dairy Cattle Official Entry Form will serve as the Animal Identification Form.

- Veterinarians recommend that cattle be treated with an intra-nasal vaccine for IBR and Parainfluenza.
- If there are fewer than 5 entries in a breed show, registered animals will be judged in Class H. Grade animals will be judged in Class P. If a junior exhibitor has more than one entry in the combined class, another junior exhibitor may show an animal.
- ALL DAIRY EXHIBITORS NEED TO VERIFY THEIR ANIMALS BY 5:00 pm on THURSDAY of Fair to receive their back tag.

Award Clarification

- Ribbon classes, along with Junior and Grand Champions, will be awarded based on quality and numbers at the discretion of the Superintendent.
- Heifers and Cows Junior and Open Division exhibit may be shown together but judged separately. One Grand and one Reserve Champion in each breed will be named.
- Supreme Champion Dairy Female Grand & Reserve Grand Champions of each class (Junior if no Grand) are eligible to show for Supreme Champion. The contest will be held after the completion of the Dairy Show.
- Due to low cow numbers, the best uddered cow of the show will be selected at the same time the Supreme Champion is selected.
- Papers for purebred animals and production records will be checked by the superintendent before their respective shows. Open
 Class exhibitors are only eligible to show purebred animals. Junior Class exhibitors will be eligible to show purebred and grade
 animals.

Age Requirements

- A spring calf is one born on or after March 1 of the exhibit year.
- A winter calf is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the year preceding the exhibit year and February 28/29 of the exhibit year.
- A fall calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between June 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- A spring yearling is one whose date of birth is between March 1 and May 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- A winter yearling is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and February 28/29 of the year preceding the exhibit year. If a winter yearling has calved, it shall be shown in the two-year-old class.
- A fall yearling is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the second year proceeding the exhibit year. If a fall yearling has calved, it shall be shown in the two-year-old class.
- A two-year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the third year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and shall include fall and winter yearlings which have freshened.
- A three-year-old is one whose date of birth is September 1 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the third year preceding the exhibit year.
- A four-year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fifth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year.
- A five-year-old and over is one whose date of birth is on or before September 1 of the sixth year preceding the exhibit year.

Definitions of group classes:

- **Junior get-of-sire** shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of the same sire. All these animals shall be under 2 years of age. Animals need not be owned by a single exhibitor.
- **Senior get-of-sire** shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of the same sire. All these animals shall be 2 years of age or over. Animals need not be owned by a single exhibitor.
- **Produce-of-dam** shall consist of 2 animals, any age, and any sex, which are the produce of one cow.
- Three best females shall consist of 3 females, any age, bred and owned by exhibitor.

Milk House Regulations

- The milking facilities at the Crawford County Fair are provided for your use and convenience. ATCP 60.12(2) prohibits milk
 from being transported from the fairgrounds back to farms to protect milk quality and safety. DO NOT use Milk House
 or wash rack drains to dump milk. Anyone caught using these areas for dumping will forfeit all premiums and awards.
- Each exhibitor using the Milk House must sign an affidavit of milk quality.
- Animals may be milked in the Milk House only during posted hours of operations. The Milk House will be closed at all other times.
- All exhibitors using milking facilities are required to abide by WI DATCP regulations to ensure saleable milk. This includes NO
 ANTIBIOTICS, mastitis, fresh cow milk, milk from unhealthy cows, bloody milk or any milk deemed unfit for human
 consumption. Exhibitors not abiding by these regulations will be responsible for contamination damages.
- Everyone using the Milk House must abide by all posted regulations pertaining to the milking of their animals including testing, care of equipment, etc.
- All exhibitors must help keep the milking area neat and clean from manure, debris, and trash.

MEAT ANIMAL AUCTION

Sale Guidelines:

- Beef or Dairy Beef Beef breeds must weigh 1,100 lbs. minimum & dairy/dairy crossbred animals must weigh 1,300 lbs. minimum.
- 2. Swine Market hog must weigh 220 lbs. minimum.
- 3. Sheep Market lamb must weigh 90 lbs. minimum.
- 4. Meat Goats must weigh over 40 lbs. and under one-year-old.
- 5. An exhibitor may only sell two animals of different species with the exception being if he/she has four grand champion animals.
- 6. ALL GRAND & RESERVE animals MUST be sold in the MEAT ANIMAL AUCTION (beef, sheep, swine, and goats).
- 7. Youth must be in at least 3rd grade and not over 19 years of age as of January 1 of the sale year.
- 8. An exhibitor must show in showmanship to sell.
- No tranquilizers are allowed on any market animal. If the superintendent suspects tranquilizers have been used, animals may be blood tested.
- 10. Any uncontrollable animals will be sent from the premises at the discretion of livestock superintendents.
- 11. All beef animals must have a double tie.
- 12. Market Animals must be ear tagged with the Fair issued tag (and scrapie tag for goats and sheep), at scheduled times. Forms must be submitted to UW-Extension before the deadline.
- 13. All animals must be fed and watered, and their pens/stalls cleaned by 10:00 AM daily. If the animal is taken home early the exhibitor will not be able to sell at next year's fair.
- 14. No medicated feed should be fed at the fair and withdrawal times must be obeyed.
- 15. Five percent commission on goats, hogs, and sheep and three percent on beef will be deducted from animals sold at the meat animal auction. The proceeds will be used for recognition of buyers and sale related expenses.
- 16. The seller will reimburse the buyer for any animal that is deemed unfit for human consumption due to natural or unnatural causes.
- 17. All new exhibitors must have a W9 on file at the Crawford County clerk's office to receive their check.
- 18. Animal exhibitors must show in market and showmanship to sell at the MAA. MAA checks will be made out to the exhibitor who exhibited the animal. If exhibitor is unable to be present the day of the MAA, the exhibitor is responsible for making a written formal request to the superintendent and the Fair Board (board has final approval and can overturn superintendent's decision) at least one week prior to animal/exhibitor drop off times list in the fair book. Exceptions may be granted on a case-by-case basis.
- 19. All meat animal exhibitors are required to have a copy of the YQCA certification or other approved Quality Assurance Certification Program certification for the current year on file in the Crawford County Extension Office.

- Junior get-of-sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of the same bull and are animals in the junior calf, senior calf, and/or summer yearling, bull, and heifer classes, with both sexes to be represented. All these animals shall be under 2 years of age. Animals need not be owned by a single exhibitor.
- Senior get-of-sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of one sire. All these animals shall be 2 years of age or over. Animals need not be owned by a single exhibitor.

HERDSMANSHIP GROUP

All clubs, groups or organizations are required to participate in herdsmanship. All aisles in all animal departments are to remain bare and clean. \$30 will be awarded to the top Club, Group or Organization in each animal department.

HERDSMANSHIP SCORING:

- 1. Neatness and cleanliness of stalls and surrounding areas (no sawdust or straw in aisle).
- 2. Stall cards, banners, educational displays, and club identification.
- 3. Evidence of regular care of animals.
- 4. Decorations based on the theme of the fair are highly encouraged.
- 5. All animal entries of Club, Group or Organization must be grouped together and CLEARLY identified.
- 6. All animal exhibitors need to comply with the Crawford County Fair Livestock Rules and Regulations.
- 7. Judging will take place at random times.

RIBBONS AND SPECIAL AWARDS

Placing Ribbons

Blue Ribbon: 1st Place, awarded to those entries that have met and exceeded the average standards established for that class.

Red Ribbon: 2nd Place, awarded to those entries that exceed the average standard.

White Ribbon: 3rd Place, awarded to those entries that meet or are slightly below the average standard

established for that class.

Pink Ribbon: 4th Place, awarded to those entries that do not meet average standard.

Special Awards

Merrit Award, Orange Ribbon: Given at the discretion of the judge to entries they feel stand out from the rest of the class.

Superintendent Award, Teal Ribbon: Given at the discretion of the Department's Superintendent.

Best in Class Ribbon, Black & Red: This award is given within the Junior Division only, to the best in a class. Only one Best in Class is awarded per class.

Best in Department, Plaque: 1 award is given to the best entry in the whole department.
